Changes to Australian Apprenticeships from 1 July

From 1 July 2024, the Department of Employment and Workplace Relations is engaging Australian Apprenticeship Service Delivery Providers (Providers) to deliver focused help that better supports apprentices and their employers from before the apprenticeship starts to its successful end. Providers will work with apprentices and employers from before an apprenticeship starts to identify individual needs, help apprentices to find the right pathway and support employers to better understand their roles and responsibilities in the workplace. How do I apply for the Defence Force?

The ADF recruitment process is designed to ensure you have the qualities needed, while helping you identify the ideal role in the Navy, Army or Air Force. Visit the <u>Defence Recruitment website</u> to find out if you are eligible to join and to access the six steps in the recruitment process. Each step has a video that explains what happens during the step. The six steps are:

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- 1. Apply online
- 2. Complete a Job Opportunities Assessment
- 3. Attend your YOU Session (Your Opportunities Unlimited Session)
- 4. Attend assessment and Officer Selection (if you are wanting this pathway)
- 5. Take a Fitness Test
- 6. Attend Enlistment and Appointment day

What is a Vocational Education and Training (VET) qualification?

The National Careers Institute says that a vocational education and training (VET) qualification is a formal certification awarded by a training provider in recognition of the successful completion of an occupational or work-related knowledge and skills-based educational program. There are eight types of <u>VET qualifications</u>:

- Certificate I, II, III and IV
- Diploma
- Advanced Diploma
- Graduate Certificate
- Graduate Diploma.

All VET qualifications must be listed on the National Register, <u>training.gov.au</u>. Visit the Australian Qualifications Framework <u>website</u> for more information regarding VET qualifications.

<u>JobJumpstart reports</u> that the Australian Government surveyed more than 3000 Australian employers to find out what advice they would give to young people looking for a job. Employers said they look for:

- a positive attitude
- motivation and enthusiasm
- someone who is prepared to learn and take direction.

They also said that applicants need to:

- be punctual and dependable
- be respectful to colleagues and customers
- show a commitment to staying in the job for an acceptable period of time.

Employers also mentioned that some young people have unrealistic expectations of work, including:

- being unprepared for the demands of the workplace
- the level of pay they would receive
- wanting to start at the top instead of working their way up.

- work out whether you are suited to a particular job
- build and demonstrate your technical and employability skills and

What's the difference between a Registered Nurse, an Enrolled Nurse and a Midwife?

Registered nurses (RN) assess, plan, provide and evaluate preventative, curative and rehabilitative care for patients and supervise other nursing staff. They work in a wide variety of settings such as hospitals, aged care and other health care facilities and private medical practices. To become a RN, you need to complete a three-year Bachelor of Nursing at a university or other accredited institute of higher education. RNs are required to be registered with the <u>Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency: Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia</u>. You can obtain more information about this occupation from the <u>myfuture website</u> (you will need to Log in or Sign up to enter this free site) and the <u>Good Universities Guide website</u> (this site has a list of nursing specialisations).

Enrolled Nurses (EN) under the direction and supervision of Registered Nurses, assist with the provision of acute, preventative, curative, rehabilitative and the day-to-day personal nursing care of patients. They work in hospitals, aged-care facilities, the community and other healthcare settings. To become an EN in Australia, the minimum level of study is the Diploma of Nursing (18 months – 2 years), delivered through TAFE or an accredited private Registered Training Organisation. After graduation, ENs apply for registration with the <u>Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency: Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia</u> to practice as an Enrolled nurse. Midwifes provide care and advice to women during pregnancy, labour and childbirth and postnatal care for women and babies in a range of settings such as the home, community, hospitals, clinics and health units. They are also known as a Certified Midwife or Registered Midwife and can specialise as a Community Midwife and/or Midwife Practitioner. A bachelor degree in midwifery is needed to work as a Midwife. Some Midwives complete postgraduate studies. Midwives are required to be registered with the <u>Australian Health</u> <u>Practitioner Regulation Agency: Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia</u>. Note that when applying for courses through QTAC, you need to identify as a First Nations Peoples person as part of your application. You may have to provide the university with a <u>Confirmation of Aboriginality</u>. To obtain this might take time, so organise it early.

QUT Indigenous Commonwealth Scholarships

The Indigenous Commonwealth Scholarships are for Indigenous students from low-income backgrounds and Indigenous students who face significant financial barriers to studying at university. These scholarships include:

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- an Indigenous Bursary (IB) of \$1,500 for one semester only, to assist Indigenous students from lowincome backgrounds to undertake study at QUT
- an Indigenous Relocation Scholarship (IRS) of \$5,000 for one year only, to assist Indigenous students who have relocated from a rural or remote area to study at QUT
- an Indigenous Costs Scholarship (ICS) of \$3,500 for one year only, to assist Indigenous students meet the cost of living and studying while at QUT.

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Use the school holidays wisely - Work experience and/or exploration may be a good option

An important strategy in career exploration is experiencing the job you are interested in. This can be undertaken in many ways:

- Work observation spending a day or more with someone already in the job at their workplace
- Career interview developing a list of questions and interviewing someone already in a job you are investigating
- Work experience spending some time (a week if possible) in the job
- Investigating courses by visiting institutions and talking to them about their courses
- Getting a part-time job or volunteering in a job you are interested in
- Doing a course or workshop that relates to the type of work you want to do.

The school holidays are a perfect time to do some of these activities. If you need help organising an activity, speak to your school Guidance Officer/Counsellor/VET Coordinator for some assistance.

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Applying for courses interstate

If you wish to apply to a university outside Queensland, you need to apply to the relevant Tertiary Admission's Centre (TAC). Find course information on the TAC websites below. You can have multiple applications running at the same time through different TACs but you need to be sure that you understand and follow the application process as it can vary from TAC to TAC. In the case of high demand courses such as medicine, veterinary science and dentistry, students often apply nationally. The different tertiary admissions' centres are:

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Term 3 - an important time for Year 12 students

Term 3 is very important and busy for Year 12 students. If you haven't already decided what you are going to do in 2025, this is the time to access information about your options. The following is a selection of events and activities that will assist you with your decision-making.

QTAC Guide – You will receive your QTAC Guide early in Term 3 or you can access/download it off the QTAC website. It contains information about the application process and the courses you can apply for in 2025. *Don't lose this book as you may need it after you leave school to change course preferences on your QTAC application when Year 12 results are released and during QTAC offer rounds.* You need to regularly check the QTAC website to ensure the information is up to date as information can change throughout the year.

Institution open days - Most of the University open days occur in Term 3. Open days provide an opportunity to learn more about the institutions and courses you are interested in. Attend the Open Days and be prepared with questions for the representatives. See Open day dates on the QTAC <u>website</u> and in the *Open Day and Career Expos* section of the fortnightly Bulletins.

QTAC applications open - QTAC applications for Semester 1 2025 courses open on 1 August. Closing dates for some courses and some scholarship applications can vary so read your QTAC book carefully. You can find information about the application process and offer process in the guide and on the <u>QTAC website</u>.

ATAR application portal - You need to apply to QTAC to get your ATAR calculated by them. The ATAR portal opens on 1 August. You will need your LUI number (Learning Unique Identifier)

Scholarships - Most university scholarship applications open in Term 3 and close in October, November or December. An exception is Bond University, which has its scholarship applications open now and each scholarship can have a different closing date. It is best to check the closing date on the Bond <u>website</u> under each scholarship entry. Every university has a scholarship section on its website. Find out the application process and due date early, to avoid missing out on a scholarship. If in doubt about your chances, apply anyway.

Year 12 post school information management

If you are in Year 12 you should start a folder of information you will need later in the year and early next year. Keep it in your room and add to it during the year. Items that could be placed in this folder include:

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- Learning Unique Identifier (LUI) number and password for your Learning Account so you can access your Year 12 results early. You will also be required to know your LUI to complete your QTAC application.
- Tax File Number (TFN), which you will need when applying for a HELP loan next year. You also need a TFN if you want to be paid for a full-time or part-time job.
- Unique Student Identifier (USI) A USI is your individual education number for life. Without one, you can't get Commonwealth financial assistance or your qualification or statement of attainment.
- The QTAC Guide, which you will receive in June or can access online at QTAC website.
- Course, job and tertiary entry information you gather at career markets/expos, institution open days, TSXPO, etc.
- The list of courses you are considering (if you haven't a clue, make an appointment to see your Guidance Counsellor/Officer ASAP!!).
- If thinking about Uni, a list of Pathway and Early Offer schemes for the university/ies you are interested in studying at
- Handouts on tertiary entry you are given at Year 12 assemblies, expos and lunchtime talks.
- Information about available scholarships and tips for submitting a great application.
- Additional qualifications you might wish to submit as part of your QTAC application and/or portfolio particularly if applying for EAS
- Any other information related to your plans for 2024.

- Where is this university located? Can I realistically travel there? What are the transport options?
- Will the university help me gain work experience in my career area of interest while I do the course?
- How hard is it to get into this course at this university?
- Are the courses at this university full-fee or are they subsidised by the Commonwealth Government and eligible for HECS-HELP?
- If the courses are full-fee, is the institution accredited for FEE-HELP?
- Where do students of this course at this university go after they graduate?
- What support services are available at this university?
- What co-curricular activities (sport, clubs, etc.) are available at this university?
- What is the 'atmosphere' or working and social environment of the university like?
- Is it important to me to go to the same university as my friends?
- Does the university offer overseas study options?

Assistance Schemes allocate adjustment factors/tertiary rank points to eligible QTAC applicants. The adjustment factors are additional points that may be used in combination with your Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) or your Tertiary Rank, to increase your competitive Selection Rank. Adjustments do not change your ATAR but change your Selection Rank for a particular course or courses. CQU have 4 different types of adjustment factors:

- Equity adjustment: Adjustment available on the basis of characteristics associated with disadvantage.
- Regional Adjustment Factor Scheme: Adjustment available on the basis of the applicant's proximity to the institution offering the course.
- CM17 Bachelor of Medical Science (Pathway to Medicine) Subject Incentive Scheme
- CM17 Bachelor of Medical Science (Pathway to Medicine) Rural Access Scheme
- Overall adjustments are capped at a maximum of 10 ATAR positions or 10 selection rank improvements from these schemes. Please note the total adjustments an applicant is eligible to

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receive for <u>CM17 Bachelor of Medical Science (Pathway to Medicine)</u> is capped at 5 ATAR positions or 5 selection rank improvements for all eligible adjustment schemes.

Adjustment Factors - they may help

Griffith University offers a range of <u>adjustment factors</u> on the basis of subjects, location, equity and sporting achievements.

- The Year 12 subject adjustment for current Year 12's, offers up to 6 adjustments (2.00 adjustments per subject/course) for a broad range of Senior subjects and up to 4 adjustments for university studies completed as part of the GUESTS program.
- The Gold Coast and Logan Campus Priority Access Scheme improves access to programs offered at Gold Coast and Logan campuses. Applicants who are new to tertiary study and live within the listed catchment areas are eligible for 2.00 adjustments.
- Nathan, Mt Gravatt and South Bank Community Engagement improves your competitiveness if you are new to tertiary study and a resident of the Brisbane, Logan, Ipswich or Redlands area, as you may be eligible for two (2.00) location adjustments when you apply for programs at the Nathan, Mt Gravatt or South Bank campuses.
- The Educational Access Scheme is for School Leavers who have experienced financial and/or educational disadvantage. Max of 8.00 adjustments.
- Elite Athlete Adjustment recognises the challenges and impacts that sporting commitments can have on the completion of their studies. You can apply for adjustment factors as part of your QTAC application, with up to 6.00 selection ranks able to be applied to your ATAR/selection rank.
- Incremental Adjustments for the Bachelor of Medical Science

Please Note:

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- Maximum adjustments that you can receive under all schemes is capped at 8.00.
- You do not need to apply separately this is part of the QTAC application.
- Some exclusions apply refer to website for further details as each scheme outlines the degrees that are excluded from the program.
