Educational Access Scheme for QTAC applicants

Students with a disability are strongly encouraged to apply for the Educational Access Scheme (EAS) when applying for tertiary courses through QTAC. You may be eligible to receive Adjustment Factors that will improve your chance of receiving a course offer. It is not too late to apply for EAS if you have already put in your QTAC application. Visit the Educational Access Scheme on the QTAC website to download the relevant cover sheet (or sheets). Complete the cover sheet and upload your supporting documents to your QTAC application (by going to 'Outstanding Documents'). The final date to submit your EAS application for the offer-rounds on 23 December 2024 is 8 December and for 16 January 2025, 9 December 2024. Visit Key dates and fees page for offer round dates or check in your QTAC 2025 Guide on Page 19.. QTAC recommends that current Year 12 students submit their application by the end of October, so additional information can be accessed from your school if necessary.

ATAR Portal registration

Have you registered on the ATAR portal to have your ATAR calculated by QTAC? Remember, when registering for the ATAR portal, **you must use your personal email address**. If you have registered using your school email address, now is the time to change it to your personal email address which will ensure you won't get locked out of your account once you graduate. To update your email address, log into the ATAR portal and update via the portal. If you have forgotten your password, you need to call QTAC on 1300 467 822. Visit the QTAC ATAR page for more information!

How to Respond to an offer

Visit the QTAC Offers webpage for specific information about responding to your offer. It's important to understand how you'll be notified and how to respond quickly to secure your place. It's important to know what options are available to you and how you will respond if you receive an offer. Click here (click on Offers at the top of the page) to find out more including:

- How QTAC will notify you
- Responding to an offer
 - Accept Check with the institution for enrolment details and dates
 - Conditional response By selecting a conditional response, you indicate that you would like to be considered for a higher preference
 - Defer Rules for course deferral vary by institution. Please visit our deferment page on our website for institution policies
 - I no longer wish to study By rejecting your offer outright, you notify QTAC that you no longer wish to study or be considered for any other preferences
- What to do if you didn't get an offer

It is essential that you respond by the due date (usually within four (4) days of receiving your offer). If you don't, your offer will lapse and you will not be considered for any other offer rounds. If you miss a due date, contact QTAC as soon as possible. Also, it may not be wise to reject an offer. If you are considering doing this, first contact QTAC on 1300 467 822 to discuss this move.

Manage your QTAC application!

After you have lodged your application, it is a good idea to login into your application from time to time to:

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- Update your contact details Phone QTAC on 1300 467 822 to change your name, date of birth, citizenship status, gender, Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander, Maori, Pasifika or Australian South Sea Islander status, gender or qualification details.
- See if you have received any correspondence from QTAC about your application
- See if you are meeting the entry requirements
- See if you have submitted any and all necessary additional documentation
- See if you get an offer?
- Q&A section

QTAC will usually communicate with you using the email address on your application (this should be your personal email - **not your school email**). Get into the habit of checking your emails regularly including Junk. Think of linking your emails to your smart phone to make it easy for you to regularly check. Read Pages 15 and 16 of your QTAC Guide for more information.

It is recommended that Year 12 students apply to QTAC early. Some courses have early and/or fixed closing dates which must be met and you can find these on Page 19 and 20 of your 2025 QTAC Guide. Also, if you are competitive (ATAR results) you may be offered a place before the major offer round in January. View the key dates here.

Pathways to university study

While an ATAR is still the most popular pathway to gaining entry to your preferred university course, it is not the only pathway available in Queensland. If you don't achieve your university course goal straight after Year 12, it is not the end of the road. There are many upgrading pathways available to you. Rural Access Scheme (RAS)

The Rural Access Scheme (RAS) is for students who have lived in rural and remote areas for five years consecutively or ten years cumulatively across any period in their lifetime. The RAS could see you benefit from a rank adjustment or a designated rural and remote quota place. Rural/remote status is determined by

the Modified Monash Model (MM) category 2- 7. Check your address <u>here</u>. A school letter is the best evidence of rural residence. Click <u>here</u> to find the application form.

Some QTAC Q&As

- Q. I applied for the Educational Access Scheme (EAS) when I applied to QTAC. What do I need to do now?
- **A.** If you didn't download an Educational Access Scheme cover sheet/s for the category/categories you are applying for, click <u>here</u> and scroll down to EAS info, then click on the relevant EAS category. The cover sheet/sheets provide a list of all documentation that you will need to submit to QTAC by the <u>Key dates</u>.
- Q. I didn't apply for the Educational Access Scheme (EAS) when I applied to QTAC. Can I still apply for EAS?
- **A.** Yes. You can go back into your application and apply for EAS. Then you need to download the relevant cover sheet (or sheets) from the <u>Assistance Scheme page</u> (scroll down) on the QTAC website. Complete all the requirements listed on the cover sheet. Attach any required supporting documents by uploading to your QTAC application or post your completed EAS application to QTAC. Some cover sheets may require a school statement. QTAC would like Year 12 students to submit their EAS applications by the end of October.
- Q. I am totally confused about offer rounds. According to the 2025 Year 12 Guide, the offer-round for my courses is 11 January 2025. Now I hear that I could get an earlier offer.
- **A.** Institutions can give offers to eligible applicants (i.e. applicants who have met all the entry requirements) at different times. Visit the <u>Course Offer Dates</u> page on the QTAC website for dates when institutions might give offers. Offers will be made on all offer-round dates. It is essential that you keep checking your emails as this is how QTAC will let you know you have an offer (don't forget to check your Spam or Junk box!). This is critical as you must respond to an offer by the due date (often within 4 days) or your offer will lapse and you will not be considered for any other courses in future offer rounds.
- Q. I applied for a university course that requires an audition but didn't do the audition. Will I still be considered for entry into this course?
- A. You should contact the university. However, the answer will probably be 'No'.
- Q. I am not sure what my ATAR will be. The Pathways (preferences 5 and 6) courses on my QTAC application have previous minimum thresholds of ATAR 78. Is this a good enough safety net?
- **A.** No. It is advisable to select pathways courses (especially your 6th preference) which indicate that all applicants received an offer in 2024. Remember, you can always go back into your QTAC application AFTER you receive your ATAR and make any changes to your preferences that will see you competitive in gaining a place in a course in 2025.
- Q. Where can I get help with my QTAC application after I leave school?
- **A.** Your best source of help at that time of the year is <u>QTAC</u>. You can ring QTAC on 1300 467 822 or use the <u>Contact Us</u> page on the QTAC website. You may want to email as the QTAC phone is very busy at this time of year and you need to be patient as you will be placed on a queue.

If you have been negatively impacted by circumstances beyond your control, Educational Access Scheme (EAS) may assist you in reaching your study dreams with rank adjustments. You might think of the obvious factors impacting your students like financial hardship, illness or disabilities, however, EAS may also help in times of natural disasters. USI: All you need to know

The USI (Unique Student Identifier) is a student's individual education number for life. From January 2023 the USI has been mandatory for all higher education students graduating in 2023 or beyond. You need a USI if you are:

- a higher education student graduating in 2023 or beyond
- undertaking Nationally Recognised Training (e.g. VET qualifications)
- a higher education student seeking Commonwealth financial assistance (e.g. a HECS-HELP loan)
- an international student studying onshore in Australia

Australian school students need to create a USI before they apply for tertiary study. There is no minimum age requirement to create a USI. Find out more about the USI on the Australian Government <u>website</u>.

Census date at Uni - important information if you are not happy at Uni

Census date is the date at which your enrolment and fee arrangements/responsibilities are considered finalised for the study period. Census date is the last date you can drop a course/subject/s without receiving a financial or academic penalty. Each university has their individual policies and you can find them by simply googling 'Census Date + Universities'. If you want to leave or defer a course/degree, make sure you talk with Student Services BEFORE census date.

Student One - Brisbane Student Accommodation

<u>Student One</u> knows that when deciding where to live, it's important to consider more than just your place of study. You're choosing your new home, so your surroundings, cost of living, work life, and social life should all be taken into account. Their location in Brisbane's central business district puts you just a short walk away from major universities, shopping centers, entertainment and nightlife. With easy access to all that Brisbane has to offer, you can explore the city and get where you need to go quickly.

The five most common university myths debunked

There are popular myths about university study some of which are:

First year Uni doesn't count – False. At most universities, first year results contribute to your final grade point average (GPA). Your GPA is of interest to future employers. Furthermore, your first year GPA (if good enough) can be used to be competitive for entry to your preferred course if you didn't get straight into it from school. You can apply for scholarships once you get to Uni and your GPA is important when applying for these scholarships.

I'll be paying off my HECS-HELP debt for the rest of my life – False. The HECS-HELP loan scheme helps you pay your part of the cost of the course you are studying (called 'Student contribution'). You begin paying it through the Australian Tax Office as part of your income tax once you have completed your course and are earning a threshold amount (\$51,550 from 1 July 2023). You don't pay interest on your debt, but it is

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indexed each year to reflect changes in the Consumer Price Index. Click <u>here</u> to access current Commonwealth Supported Places and HECS-HELP information.

I'll never find a job after graduation — Competition for jobs is high. However, you can increase your employability while you are studying by gaining work experience in the field in which you want to work. This not only looks good on your resume, but it also gives employers a chance to see what sort of worker you are. Don't wait until your final year at uni to start looking for jobs. Access the uni Careers and Employment services and programs early during your studies.

If I don't make friends during O Week, I never will — For those who don't know, O Week is Orientation Week which is usually the week before lectures begin. This is an important week as the information you receive will introduce you to the support services and other activities available. You will have many additional opportunities to make friends during your Uni studies. If you're not particularly comfortable starting up a conversation with a random in class, get involved in a university club or two.

Lectures can be skipped – Yes and No. Lectures are usually recorded and made available online, so technically, you don't need to attend in person. However, there is good reasons why you should go to every class. Attendance might form part of a percentage of your final mark. You're paying to sit in that lecture theatre, so you might as well show up and enjoy it. Lectures provide an opportunity to make new friends and of course, impress a lecturer or two. Lecturers are great contacts for future employment.

Tips for making the most of O Week

After leaving school, the big, wide world of TAFE or Uni can be downright 'scary' for a fresh high-school graduate. Luckily, all universities provide some type of orientation, known as O Week, for new students to welcome them and give them a chance to get to know the environment before classes start.
