Disabilities

Australian Government: Disability Employment Services

The Australian Government's Disability Employment Services (DES) can help you find and keep a job if you have a disability. DES providers can help you gain the job-ready and job-seeking skills you may need. If necessary, they can also provide support once you are in a job. Visit the <u>DES website</u> for more information about this service.

Have you applied for Educational Access Scheme?

Students with a disability are strongly encouraged to apply for the Educational Access Scheme (EAS) when applying for tertiary courses through QTAC. The benefit of this scheme is that you may be eligible to receive Adjustment Factors that may improve your chance of receiving a course offer. It is not too late to apply for EAS if you have already put in your QTAC application. Visit the Educational Access Scheme page on the QTAC website to download the relevant cover sheet (or sheets). Comply with all the requirements on the cover sheet and upload your documents to your QTAC application (by going to 'Outstanding Documents'). If the document you need to provide isn't listed in 'Outstanding Documents', you can email your documents to QTAC. The final date to submit your EAS application for the offer-round on 14 January 2021 is 11 December 2020. See the Key dates and fees page for due dates for other offer rounds. QTAC recommends that current Year 12 students submit their application by the end of October, so additional information can be accessed from your school if necessary.

Studying at QUT with a disability, injury or health condition

Prospective students with a disability, injury or health condition are encouraged to make a pre-enrolment appointment with a QUT Disability Adviser to discuss their situation and potential adjustments which could assist their university learning. Have you heard about Financial dealers, Sales Demonstrators or Aged and Disabled Carers?

<u>Financial Dealers</u> conduct financial market transactions on behalf of clients. You usually need a university qualification in commerce, finance, accounting, economics or actuarial science to work as a Financial Dealer. Some workers have a Vocational Education and Training (VET) qualification.

<u>Sales Demonstrators</u> display and demonstrate goods at commercial premises, exhibitions and private homes. You can work as a Sales Demonstrator without formal qualifications. Some on the job training may be provided.

Aged and Disabled Carers provide general household assistance, emotional support, care and companionship for aged and disabled persons in their own homes. They are also known as Personal Care Worker, or Personal Carer. You can work as an Aged or Disabled Carer without formal qualifications, however, a certificate III or IV in aged care, disability, mental health, community services or another related field may be useful.

I've Never Had a Job Before - How Do I Get A Christmas Casual Job?

Summer Jobs suggest that one of the BEST ways to get your first job is to apply for a Christmas casual job. Some employers will still want to see retail experience on your resume - employers such as high-end retailer Tiffany & Co. <u>QUT Excellence Scholarships (Academic)</u> are valued at \$10,000 and up to \$30,000 for high achieving school leavers with outstanding academic performance (ATAR 98.00 and above).

<u>QUT Budding Entrepreneur Scholarships</u> are valued at up to \$24,000 and are aimed at innovative individuals who are engaged in their passion for entrepreneurial action.

<u>QUT Sport Scholarships</u> are valued at \$5,000, \$10,000 and \$20,000 and are awarded to athletes competing at varying levels of sport from elite athletes to sportspeople who are developing and progressing in their sport.

<u>QUT Esport Scholarships</u> are valued at \$5,000 and are awarded to players who demonstrate abilities to perform and progress within an online esports game environment, specifically within the League of Legends.

Know exactly what you're signing up for – research is the key. Visit the <u>Money Smart website</u>, for a comprehensive guide on everything you need to know about banking, budgeting, saving and investment.

Cover what you need, save for what you want. Avoid the lure of 'have now, pay later' options.

Save, save, and save some more. It's worth having two bank accounts, one for big things you are saving for (car?) and another for emergencies (the washing machine breaks down).

Superannuation is so important. You want the future-you to be thanking the current-you for being a sustainable planner.

Don't ever add 'backup funds' (e.g. planning to borrow from Mum, Dad, or someone else if you run out of money) to your budget. Shut those opportunity doors. They aren't secure financial pathways, and chances are you'll burn those relationships out a lot quicker than you can spend someone else's money.

Take your time to find out what works for you.



ACU Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Accommodation Scholarship

This scholarship was established to assist Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students who are living away from home and their community. <u>The scholarship</u> covers the cost of accommodation so you can concentrate on your studies and make the most of the university experience.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander student entry to QUT

Students who are of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander descent and would like to study at QUT may be eligible for entry through the Oodgeroo Unit's <u>Centralised Assessment Selection Program</u> (CASP). CASP is an admissions pathway that can assist Australian Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people enter most undergraduate courses at QUT. Chris Lewis Scholarship

Offers to the college for Year 12 graduates are not based on ATAR results - students don't even need to be studying an ATAR pathway to be eligible to study with Griffith College. If you are applying for entry into tertiary education courses for 2021 you must submit written statements and complete an online questionnaire to address your suitability criteria for the course. These form part of your QTAC application. These statements must be submitted before the QTAC documentation due dates (see Key dates on the QTAC website). You must have submitted your statements by 9 December 2020 for the 23 December 2020 and the 11 December 2020 for the 14 January 2020 offer rounds. Visit the QTAC website to view a Fact Sheet explaining what is required in the written statements.

Pathways to university study

While an ATAR is still the most popular pathway to gaining entry to your preferred university course, it is not the only pathway available in Queensland. If you don't achieve your university course goal straight after Year 12 it is not the end of the road. There are many upgrading pathways available to you. Several tertiary institutions have web pages dedicated to the alternative pathways to tertiary studies.

QTAC Q & As

- Q. I applied for the Educational Access Scheme (EAS) when I applied to QTAC. What do I need to do now?
- **A.** If you didn't download an Educational Access Scheme cover sheet/s for the category/categories you are applying for, <u>click here</u>, scroll down to cover sheets, then click on the relevant EAS category. The cover sheet/sheets provide a list of all documentation that you will need to submit to QTAC by the <u>due date</u>.
- Q. I didn't apply for the Educational Access Scheme (EAS) when I applied to QTAC. Can I still apply for EAS?
- **A.** Yes. Download the relevant cover sheet (or sheets) from the <u>EAS page</u> on the QTAC website. Complete all the requirements listed on the cover sheet. Attach any required supporting documents. You then upload or email your completed EAS application to QTAC. Some cover sheets may require a school statement. QTAC would like Year 12 students to submit their EAS applications by the end of October.
- Q. I am totally confused about offer rounds. According to the 2021 Year 12 Guide, the offer-round for my courses is 24 January 2021. Now I hear that I could get an earlier offer.

- **A.** Institutions can give offers to eligible applicants (i.e. applicants who have met all the entry requirements) at different times. Visit the <u>Course Offer Dates</u> page on the QTAC website for dates when institutions might give offers. Offers will be made on all offer-round dates. It is essential that you keep checking your emails as this is how QTAC will let you know you have an offer. This is critical as you must respond to an offer by the due date (often within 4 days) or your offer will lapse and you will not be considered for any other courses in future offer rounds.
- Q. I applied for a university course that requires an audition but didn't do the audition. Will I still be considered for entry to this course?
- **A.** You should contact the university. However, the answer will probably be 'No'.
- Q. I am not sure what my ATAR will be. The Pathways (preferences 5 and 6) courses on my QTAC application have previous cut-offs of OP 11. Is this a good enough safety net?
- **A.** No. It is advisable to select Pathways courses (especially your 6th preference) which indicate that all applicants received an offer in 2021. Remember, you can always go back into your QTAC application AFTER you receive your ATAR and make any changes to your preferences that will see you competitive in gaining a place in a course in 2021.
- Q. Where can I get help with my QTAC application after I leave school?
- **A.** Your best source of help at this time of the year is <u>QTAC</u>. You can ring QTAC on 1300 467 822 or email QTAC. Email is probably best, as the QTAC phone is very busy at this time of year and you need to be patient as you will be on a queue.



10 visible signs of stress

<u>Growing Leaders</u> suggests some things to look out for so you can nip stress in the bud. As you live a pressurised life, especially during 2020, here are some common signs to look for that signal you may be dealing with disproportionate stress:

1. Withdrawal from family or friends

Out of the need to survive the pressure, are you withdrawing from normal activities, even social time with family and peers?

2. Emotional changes: short temper, low patience, or irritability

Do you react to stress by becoming emotionally volatile—either displaying a short fuse, running out of patience quickly, or being irritable?

3. The inability to make decisions

Do you sometimes become internally paralyzed, just shut down, become overwhelmed, and freeze?

4. Increased drama, emotion, and exaggeration

Do you react by an extra dose of drama or hyperbole, disproportionate to the situation? Emotion outweighs the situation.

5. Quitting commitments and irresponsibility

Are you pulling out of situations or activities that are proving to be stressful?

6. Physical signs: they get sick often, complaining about aches or bowel issues

Do you have these physical signs of stress - headaches or stomach aches; constipated or become sick more often your immune system not working well?

7. Eating or sleeping habits change

Have you lost your appetite, or are eating too much due to stress? finding it hard to fall asleep due to stress, unable to turn your brain off at night?

8. Coping mechanisms

Are you relying on artificial coping mechanisms such as alcohol or drugs to get through the stress - they don't work!

9. Cognitive changes—decreased focus, forgetfulness, or carelessness

Are you finding it hard to concentrate or study, forgetful or careless about things that used to matter to you?

10. Negative self-talk

Do you tell yourself that your 'glass is constantly half empty'?

If you feel any of these symptoms for more than two or three weeks, you should talk to your guidance officer/school counsellor or speak with your doctor. Stress can be managed with some positive conversations and strategies. YOU DON'T HAVE TO BE THAT STRESSED!
